Dare We Imagine the World to Be Different? Dare we not!



Lent is a season of reflection, repentance, and renewal. It is a time when we journey with Christ toward the cross, remembering His suffering and sacrifice. But it is also a time when we are called to reimagine the world—to see it not as it is but as it could be, transformed by the power of God's kingdom. Dare we imagine a world different from the one we know? Dare we believe that Christ's victory over sin and death has implications

not only for eternity but for the here and now?

Increasingly the future of our world seems uncertain. Power and politics, and greed and money have changed the shape of our world. Friends are now seen as enemies: enemies are now seen to be friends and allies. The history of trusted relationships and allegiance, past sacrifice for shared goals, all seems to be evaporating. The future appears to be in the hands of a few, very wealthy men. In 2017 the world's eight richest men owned the same wealth as the poorest half of the world's population. From 2020 their collective wealth doubled.

As Christians, we affirm that God is sovereign over all things. His kingdom is not merely a distant reality, awaiting fulfilment at the end of time: rather, it has already broken into history through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Christ Himself proclaimed, "The kingdom of God is at hand; repent and believe in the gospel" (Mark 1:15). The guestion before us is not whether God's kingdom is coming—it is already here. The question is whether we have the faith to live as if this is true.

Too often, we become resigned to the brokenness of the world. We see injustice, suffering, and sin, and we assume that little can be done until Christ returns. But Jesus did not call His disciples to passive waiting. He called them to be salt and light, to pray for God's will to WE LIVE AND DIE on earth as it is in heaven" (Matthew 6:10), and to proclaim the good news of redemption. If we truly

believe in the power of the gospel, then we must dare to imagine-and work toward-a world shaped by God's righteousness, justice, and peace.

This does not mean that we place our hope in human efforts or political systems. The kingdom of God is not built through earthly power but through the transforming work of the Spirit. It is seen wherever love overcomes hatred, wherever mercy triumphs over judgment, wherever the weak are lifted, and the lost are found. When we forgive rather than seek revenge, when we serve rather than demand, when we embody the love of Christ in our relationships, we

Lent is an opportunity to examine the ways in which we have settled for the status quo rather than living in the light of God's promises. Have we grown complacent in our faith? Have we accepted the divisions and



injustices of our world as inevitable? Have we limited the power of God's redemption to our personal salvation while ignoring its implications for society? This season calls us to repent of our unbelief, to turn from apathy to action, and to embrace the hope that Christ has indeed made all

things new (Revelation 21:5).

Dare we imagine the world to be different? Yes, because the resurrection

of Jesus proves that the way things are is not the way they must remain. Dare we have the faith to believe in God's kingdom here on earth? Yes, because He has already begun this good work, and He invites us to join Him in it. May this Lenten season deepen our vision and embolden our faith as we live as citizens of God's kingdom—now and forever. Amen.

After a hopeful and inspiring closing service led by Rev Andrew Harrex; Moderator of The Southern Presbytery - followed by A Communion of Our Faith - led by Rev Andrew Howley, inside the St Mungo's Church Building.

The Rev Andrew Harrex led the people, carrying symbols of the St Mungo's Church services. These were:- Rian Snodgrass carrying The Holy Bible; Louise Sinclair carrying the Teapot representing hospitality & the offering plate; Lily Sinclair carrying the Communion silver plate for the communion bread: John Grenfell carrying the Chalice cup and Pitcher for communion wine; the rest of those present followed them outside to continue the service under the large Elm tree. Seating was provided for those wishing to sit down.

After all the formalities were finished the people then were invited to an afternoon tea in the Sunday School room. There was a lot of talk and everyone seemed to be recalling their time as part of the congregation at St Mungo's.

"I will praise thee, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made..." Psalm 139:14 Our Heavenly Father blessed our islands of the sea. From the northern islands across the ocean to the southern islands, the golden sun shines through the clear blue skies and birds freely fly. From the

bright white sandy shores all the way to the highest mountain top, our islands are abundant with fresh produce and colourful flora and fauna. The lagoons and oceans are bountiful with sea life, fish and gems (like black pearls), which link us to the world.

On each island, the mighty coconut tree stands tall, a symbol of strength and goodness. The coconut tree provides for our health and well-being. We have discovered how to use every part, from the fronds to the very deep roots. For food, drink, medicine, shelter and much more. The coconut tree is essential to our survival, and is the tree of life for our people. We are grateful for the arrival of Christianity to our shores 200 years ago. Christianity brought hope, peace and light, with an understanding of the gospel of Jesus Christ. In time, our cultures have interwoven with Christianity, and the blessings are evident today. As guardians and caretakers of God's marvellous works, we always treasure these words, "I made you wonderful."

Our women play a vital role in keeping our heritage and traditions alive. They are the keepers of talents, teachers and mentors. From mothers to daughters, the cycle of life, faith and love continues here on our islands of paradise. We show our respect and love for God and for one another in harmonies of song and prayer. Our precious Tivaevae quilts represent patience, love and unity. We honour God's love and mercy with hats we wear to church, woven by skilful loving hands from the strands of rito, the young coconut leaf. We adorn ourselves with sweet scented Tiare tropical flowers, made into crowns and garlands. From the heart, we teach and nurture our beloved children, the younger generation, our future.

At the closing of a gathering, our Tongareva elders always say these powerful words of encouragement—"Kia mau te serenga! Kia mau te napena! Kia mau!" This means "Hold on tight to who you are, in all aspects of your existence!" We are wonderfully made by God, and we should cherish all the aspects of who we are!

About the artists: Tarani Napa and Tevairangi Napa are a Mother-Daughter artist team from the Cook Islands. They feel honoured to have been able to share this piece of artwork in recognition of their love for their home, their faith and, and their heritage. Tarani Napa is a mother of six children and three grandchildren. She is a certified primary school teacher, entrepreneur and creative artist. Tevairangi Napa is the eldest daughter of Tarani, and she is a proud mum of two children. She follows in her mother's footsteps as a creative artist.



If you have an egg cup to put the egg into that will stop it from rolling around while you are trying to make your pattern. Once you have finished doing one side then turn it up the other way but make sure it is dury first. Turn it over and then draw or point the rost of the pattern then draw or paint the rest of the pattern on the other half of the egg. You can also colour in the picture of the egg.
